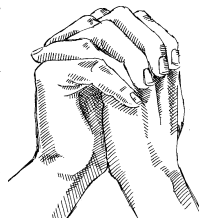

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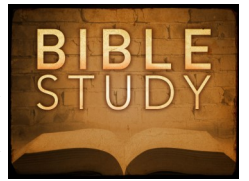

A SEASON OF NEW LIFE

Happy Easter! Over the next seven weeks, the Church helps us unpack what it means to have died and risen with Jesus Christ. The Sunday readings are intentionally “mystagogical,” that is, they help us explore the mysteries of our faith. While this is traditionally the time that the neophytes, or newly baptized, devote to reflecting on the experience of their baptism and exploring in more depth this new Christian life of theirs, it is also a time for the whole Christian community to join them in that reflection. In the Gospels on successive Sundays we encounter Thomas with his doubts, Jesus and Peter on the shore of the Sea of Tiberias, Jesus the Good Shepherd, the Great Commandment to love one another, and the coming of the Holy Spirit, not to mention Jesus’ ascension into heaven. We could mine these depths for years and not be finished!

At the same time that we explore these scriptural riches, most parishes are busier than at any other time of the year. There are baptisms, First Communions, confirmations, weddings, and meetings and gatherings of all kinds. After our Lenten inward reflections we seem to be eager to move out into the world with new energy. And while some of us may have had more (or less) success than others in sticking to our Lenten resolutions, St. John Chrysostom reassures us that Easter is for everybody: “You who kept the fast, and you who did not keep the fast, be joyful now! The table is richly set: come, take from it, all of you, without any scruple. The fatted calf suffices for all: let no one go away hungry. Come, all of you: taste the feast of faith! Come all of you: enjoy the feast of forgiveness!” (“Floral Triodion,” Paschal Matins, composite translation). Perhaps this spring there is still hesitancy because of the pandemic, or perhaps there is fresh eagerness to partake of the new life; either way, the abundance of life around us is real.

Beyond parish borders, the world is awakening, too. Springtime activities abound, outdoor sports resume, gardens and farm fields are planted. The newness of the world matches the newness in our hearts if we let it. Perhaps our task this spring is to find resurrection in our world as well as in our hearts. When you come to Mass, bask in the new life proclaimed in the scriptures and in our Eucharistic banquet. Then after Mass, look around you at the bountiful new life wherever it may be, and feel what it means to be risen, really risen, with Jesus Christ our Lord. Then spread that “new life” feeling by the way you live with and for others each day.

REFLECTION ON THE THEME FOR THE WEEK:

“We will . . . make our dwelling with him (or her)” (John 14:23), Jesus promises his disciples in his conversation with them at the Last Supper. He tells them that the Holy Spirit will come after he leaves. The Holy Spirit dwells with us, guides us, counsels us, advocates for us, and gives us peace. The leaders of the early church relied on the Holy Spirit when facing issues Jesus had not explicitly addressed. For instance, Paul and Barnabas asked them to decide what Jewish practices were necessary for Gentile Christians. A requirement of circumcision would have been a burden to men with no tradition of the practice. More significantly, it relegated women to second-class status. Guided by the Holy Spirit, the decision they made brought peace to the newly baptized Gentiles. Two thousand years later, the Holy Spirit still dwells with us and guides us. May we allow the Holy Spirit to guide us to peace, the peace that Jesus gave to his disciples with some of the last words before he died and in his first words to them after he rose.
